**HORSHAM JUNIOR CONSERVATIVES
MEETING AND CONCERT**

There was a large audience at the Conservative Hall last evening on the occasion of the annual general meeting and concert in connection with the Horsham Junior Conservative and Unionist Association. Mr E H Hawlins (President) occupied the chair and was supported by Major L H Parry (Hon Secretary), Mr H E M Turner (Unionist Agent), Mr J H Bottomley (Junior Imperial and Constitutional League), Mr E H Baker and Mr J Langley. In a letter regretting his inability to attend, Earl Winterton, M.P., said the Horsham Juniors were the leading unit in the fine Junior Unionist organisation in the Division. The good they did for the Cause was incalculable, and he was very proud of them. He hoped that they would be ready to face an Election which might come at any moment, and that they would work hard to get recruits, not being afraid, if necessary, to go out and get young men in the villages around Horsham to join them. There were a lot of keen young Unionists in these villages, who he thought would be glad to join the Association.

In the course of the evening, Mr Bottomley, who had come straight from Norwich, gave a stirring address. He said the representatives of their party had had a meeting that had not been equalled in the present generation. He could speak with some knowledge, because for thirty three years he had never once been absent from the annual gathering of their party. Speaking of the weakness and vacillation of the Government, especially as exemplified by the release of Larkin, Mr Bottomley said a resolute Government and a determined party was the best to govern both Ireland and this country also. The Americans were beginning to see that this Government was weak, and if they complained Mr Redmond's back would be straightened and he would give more marching orders to the Government. It was
